Around 1885 two young brothers, Edward Martin Tucker and William Perry Tucker, one a lawyer the other a farmer, and moved to Montana from Missouri. Their father had died when they were at a young age and they were raised by their mother. They graduated from college at the University of Montana in Missoula Montana. After school, they occupied and ranched 640 acres of the Tucker Crossing area. In December, 1916, H.S. Lord was approved to start building a bridge linking on the east and west sides of Tucker Crossing. This bridge would be a great convenience for many travelers. In 1945 in this area the S&W sawmill would be built Loren Kraft, Gene Kraft, and Francis Frost. The main feature of the sawmill was a sawdust burner.

The Tucker Crossing area is now quite active. Fishing areas are accessed on both the eastern and Western sides of the river. The river is now managed by Montana's Fish, Wildlife, and Parks.
